25, 50, and 75 Years Ago in QST (October 2012)

QST publishes a column every month towards the back of the magazine that highlights from issues 25, 50, and 75 years ago. Now that the QST archive is online, it's really worth taking a look at these articles. Here are a few that caught my eye in October:

October 1937

- * Modernizing the Simple Regenerative Receiver (http://p1k.arrl.org/pubs_archive/19076) by Vernon Chambers, W1JEQ. This a nicely-designed and built regen using two tubes, a 6K5 pentode and 6C5 triode. I'm going to keep this design in mind if I ever get around to playing with all the tubes I have. As an aside, I searched on W1JEQ's callsign and found out that he wrote 87 articles for QST from 1936 through February 1958. This was his third article.
- * Concentrated Directional Antennas for Transmission and Reception (http://p1k.arrl.org/pubs_archive/19078) by John L. Reinartz, W1QP, and Burton T. Simpson, W8CPC. This article describes two different antennas. The first is a half-wave loop antenna that the author says works on 2-1/2, 5, 10, and 20m. The second is a square loop antenna called a "signal squirter" for 14 Mc.

October 1962

- * In "New Apparatus" (http://p1k.arrl.org/pubs_archive/46246) on page 27, a key made by J. A. Hills, W8FYO, of Dayton, OH is shown under the heading, "New Key Mechanism for Electronic Keyers." The photo clearly shows a key whose design was adopted by Bencher for the BY-1 paddle.
- * The Towering Problem (http://p1k.arrl.org/pubs_archive/46122) by Jay Kay Klein, WA2LII clearly shows that putting up towers have always been a problem for amateur radio operators. This is a humorous take on the problem. What's notable is that this type of humorous article almost never appears in QST anymore. Amateur radio seems to have lost its sense of humor, or at least its cadre of humorous writers.

October 1987

* Stalking Those Fugitive Components (http://p1k.arrl.org/pubs_archive/81357) by Doug DeMaw, W1FB. Today, we often complain about the demise of local parts suppliers, but this article shows that this was a problem 25 years ago as well. W1FB gives some advice that I gave not long ago on my blog. That is, stock up on parts, especially when you find a good deal on them, and you won't have to scrounge around for them when you

MINUTES BY ED COMPOS—K5CRQ (OCT BY DOUG KC5ZQM)



TRO Meeting minutes 25 SEP 12

President Stan Callahan, KE5HPB, opened the meeting with introductions at 1927 hrs.

Secretary Ed Compos, K5CRQ was absent, so no reading of the miniutes from August meeting. The minutes were in the Signal. Mark Conklin, N7XYO

moved to accept the minutes as published. Brian Gnad, KB5TSI, seconded and motion carried. Doug Lee, KC5ZQM, took minutes and attendance log for the meeting.

Treasurer Gary Parham, KC5ZQP, read the Treasury Report, which was same as what was in the Signal. Mark, N7XYO, moved and Charles Burka, KE5AHE seconded to approve the report, motion carried.

Vice President Joe Gorkos, N5TEX, repoorted on his trip to the TAPR (Tucson Amateur Packet Radio) conference in Atlanta GA. Lots of presenters were programmers using a variety of languages and platforms. A contigent of D-Star demonstrators were there as well. Joe mentioed that his son did a presentation on Intorduction to APRS. The prize line-up was impressive, featuring the latest Kenwood digital radios. Joe also won a book on DSP (digital signal processing). Joe finished his report with an overview of his adventurous filghts to and from the confrerence.

Engineering Chairman Steve Miller, AA5V, gave a report that mostly followed the one published in the Signal. He focued on the Keetonville remote receiver, the Sun Building lease agreement, status of the 146.94 repeater, the return of 444.1 to Skyline East, and the arrangement at Autmn Oaks.

Keetonville receiver - fully operational with a PL of 88.5, same as Skiatook. Some tweaking still needed to get the system balanced. Thanks to Ed, K5CRQ for reprogramming the receivers, and setting them to use Pin 8 as a COS (carrier operated squelch) as well as Pin 4. Stan, KE5HPB reproted that 146.88 worked well for the Bike MS event, as far as Davenprot OK, between Stroud and Chandler.

Sun Building - Steve forwarded the lease signed by Stan to the Oklahoma Investment Partners, they have also signed it. Steve is waiting to receive a key, and he should have access anytime to the building. He is also familiar with the building, having worked there for years many years ago.

146.94 Repeater - getting close to ready for placement at Sun Building. Steve did have to re-arrange the components in the cabinet to allow easier access to the controller. He should have this wrapped up soon as the cooler weather affords him more time for these projects.

444.1 - ready to go back to Skyline East, just need to schedule a time. Autumn Oaks - 146.805 and 444.950 get to stay there, thanks to Mike Reynolds, W0KIE. An Internet line is in place to the repeaters, so Echolink and IRLP are possible, just need to check with Brad Smith, KC5SP and Mark Thrash, WB5MBK about what they have planned and what they have done.
